Choughs in the Malverns

Graham Hill

British Wildlife (Volumes 31 no.1) reported sightings of two Choughs *Pyrrhocorax pyrrhocorax* at British Camp in the Malvern Hills between 28th July and 2nd August 2019, the first record in Worcestershire since 1826. Although the Chough is considered to be a bird of the costal cliffs the article reports several sightings are in inland England. During the early summer of both 2006 and 2007 I made regular visits to the Knapp and Papermill Nature Reserve at Alfrick Pound as part of a programme of fieldwork there. During one of those visits I saw a small black bird with distinctive red, slightly downturned, bill and red legs. As I was driving at the time, I only had a quick view, my first thought was that I had just seen a Chough and that was really unusual, although on further reflection I persuaded myself that I hadn't – after all they are coastal birds aren't they? The bird certainly *looked* like a chough but it was in the wrong place. I concluded that my initial identification was wrong.

However, the sightings on the Malvern Hills 12 years later suggest that, perhaps, my initial instinct was right after all!
