Paykullia maculata The Woodlouse Fly, Diptera, Rhinophoridae

Casting an eye over the shady bark of an Oak tree whilst out walking in Blakedown on 5th September my attention was drawn to a Picture Winged Fly thereon. I decided to pot it for a better look later (01).

The fly was identified with the help of the Dipterists Chris Raper and Ian Andrews as *Paykullia maculata* in the Rhinophoridae, Woodlouse Fly, family.

Paykullia maculata, commonly called the Picture-winged Woodlouse-fly, in most frequently seen between June and August, and is known to favour the shade. Its larvae are known to be internal parasites of both the Common Rough Woodlouse Porcellio scaber, and The Common Shiny Woodlouse Oniscus asellus.

Its UK status is regarded as widespread though somewhat localised and probably overlooked. There are four previous records for VC 37 Worcestershire in the Worcestershire Biological Records Centre database.
