## An unusual colour form of Scarlet Elfcap Sarcoscypha austriaca var. austriaca (O. Beck ex Sacc.) Boud.

Fungi are poorly represented generally in wildlife reporting and Worcestershire Recorders (WR) are fairly typical, with few reports appearing in Worcestershire Record. As Graham Martin pointed out in issue 52 of Worcestershire Record (Martin 2024), we now have a new name 'Funga' to set the fungal kingdom on a par with Flora and Fauna. Perhaps this may encourage WR members to consider writing the occasional note or article on this under-appreciated kingdom - I can but hope!

To provide some interest, I can report an interesting 'form' of the normally red Scarlet Elfcap [aka Elfcup] *Sarcoscypha austriaca* var. *austriaca*, found by Denise Bingham at Dunclent near Kidderminster in a wet Alder carr woodland on 24<sup>th</sup> February 2024 (01 & 02). Scarlet Elfcap is common in Worcestershire often on fallen *Fraxinus*, *Salix*, *Acer* or *Corylus* twigs in damp or wet woodland. This orange colour is caused by a lack of pigments. There is a very rare (just one British record?) yellow variant *Sarcoscypha austriaca* var. *lutea* and telling the two apart is very difficult but due to the extreme rarity of the latter I have assumed the Dunclent elfcaps to be the commoner form *austriaca*.

Just to add further confusion there is Ruby Elfcap Sarcoscypha coccinea, formerly considered to be the most frequent species, but now known to be uncommon and it occurs typically on Fagus, Ulmus and Corylus on drier sites, and is smaller in size (<5cm) and darker red in colour. A microscope is required to be certain, by checking the hairs on the outer surface of the cup: look for uncoiled hairs in S. coccinea and coiled hairs in S. austriaca.

Despite the problems in identification of many fungi, I hope a few WR members will take up the Funga challenge and add to our knowledge of this kingdom in the county.
